- The number in brackets (e.g. (7.1) indicates its difficulty. This scale runs from 0.1 to 15+; however, the two extremes of the scale have not been used for this booklist. Please note that for some titles this information is unavailable.
- Books with (!) are recommended for more mature pupils and these books may contain content, themes or language that may not be suitable for some pupils.
- Most pupils should aim to consistently read books that are rated as 5.0 and above; this will offer a good level of challenge for the majority of pupils, although this is of course dependent upon the pupil's starting point. Therefore, this is only offered as a guideline pupils are encouraged to read books which offer a suitable level of challenge, which may be lower or higher than 5.0.
